



Mark Stabile is Director of the School of Public Policy and Governance at the University of Toronto and Associate Professor of Economics at the Rotman School of Management. He is also a Research Associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research, Cambridge Massachusetts and a fellow at the Rimini Centre for Economic Analysis, Italy. From 2003-2005 he was the Senior Policy Advisor to the Ontario Minister of Finance where he worked on health, education, and tax policy. He has been a visiting faculty member at Princeton University, the University of Chicago and Columbia University. His recent work focuses on the economics of child health and development, the public/private mix in the financing of health care, and tax policy and health insurance. His recent publications include "Child Mental Health and Human Capital Accumulation: the Case of ADHD," in the *Journal of Health Economics*, "Socio-economic Status and Child Health: Why is the Gradient Stronger for Older Children," in the *American Economic Review*, "The Integration of Child Tax Credits and Welfare: Evidence from the Canadian National Child Benefit Program," in the *Journal of Public Economics*. He has advised the Senate of Canada, Health Canada, and the Ontario Ministry of Health, among others, on health care reform. He is co-editor of *Exploring Social Insurance: Can a Dose of Europe Cure Canadian Health Care Finance*, published in 2008 by the McGill-Queen's University Press. Professor Stabile received his Ph.D. from Columbia University and his BA from the University of Toronto.
